The 4-day conference engaged youth leaders around the world in global discussions where they can express and share different opinions and perspectives focused on the event's theme "The World's Dilemma: Enhancing World Action on Climate Change".

This enabled the participants to develop networks and enhance their diplomatic, leadership and communication skills through paper presentations, debates and lectures from distinguished speakers across the globe.

According to BatStateU student regent Hannah Cathrisse Dimaano who was one of the delegates, the

BatStateU reclaims top spot in the MELE 2019, Imbo ranks 10th

Batangas State University has once again proved excellence in the field of mechanical engineering, landing first in the list of top performing schools in the recently concluded Mechanical Engineering Licensure Examination (MELE) last February 2019.

Philippine Regulation Commission (PRC) results showed 119 of 132 Red Spartan ME graduates passed the exam garnering a 90.15% passing rate, way above the 50.49% national passing rate.

Angelo Areta Imbo placed 10th among the newest batch of topnotchers with 89.60%.

In the February 2018 MELE, BatStateU was previously hailed as the top performing school (99.15% passing rate) with seven of its graduates in the list of topnotchers.

Among the seven Red Spartan Graduates who entered that top 10 are; Kelvin Mendoza Macatangay (Rank 1), Efren Espino Suarez, Jr. (Rank 3), Emanuelito Abion Aristorenas (Rank 5), Hazel Joy Diola Veyra (Rank 6), Dyve Balbalosa De Ocampo (Rank 7), Adrian Danao Bautista (Rank 8), and Anna Rizza Regalado Ebreo (Rank 10).

Seminar on Industry 4.0 held



INDUSTRY 4.0. Kirsten Davila Rieth, RTI Director for Strategy and innovation, led university junior and senior officials, members of the Faculty Confederation and the Supreme Student Council Confederation in understanding more about manufacturing the current environment of industries.

A seminar on Industry 4.0 with the theme "Demystifying Industry 4.0 - How Universities Can Participate?" was conducted by Batangas State University on February 4 in preparation for Strategic Plan 2019-2029 at the Lecture Room, International Affairs Office, BatStateU Pablo Borbon Main I, Batangas City.

University junior and senior officials and members of the Faculty Confederation and Supreme Student Council Confederation gathered for the seminar that had two sessions on Industry 4.0 and Manufacturing and the different opportunities and challenges in the Industry 4.0 environment.

This hopes to prepare the BatStateU academic community for Strategic Plan 2019-2029.

RTI's Director for Strategy and Innovation Ms. Kirsten Davila Rieth served as the resource speaker of the event. She talked about the current manufacturing trends and imparted some important matters to consider before investing in Industry 4.0 technologies.

As for the second session, Rieth gave tips on how the university can contribute in boosting the university industry.

Aside from the lectures, a post processing discussion was held to get different inputs from the participants. Department of Trade and Industry (DTI) Advisor for Innovation, Research, and Entrepreneurship Dr. Napoleon K. Juanillo facilitated the activity where students and faculty members had separate sessions.

University President Dr. Tirso A. Ronquillo, on the other hand, explained the need to fully understand the concepts of Industry 4.0 and how it can help in developing the university's strategic plan in his closing remarks.

BatStateU welcomes pioneer batch of off-campus DRM classes

Batangas State University made history with its disaster risk management (DRM) education as it welcomed the pioneer batch of its first ever off-campus DRM classes on February 16 at the National Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Council (NDRRMC) Building, Camp General Emilio Aguinaldo, Quezon City

The university currently offers two DRM programs under the College of Accountancy Business Economics and International Hospitality Management – the Master in Disaster Risk Management (MDRM) and the Diploma in Disaster Risk Management (DDRM).

"We are overwhelmed by the acceptance shown by the Office of Civil Defense (OCD) and the Philippine Army," BatStateU President Dr. Tirso A. Ronquillo told the 21 enrollees under the DDRM program from the aforementioned agencies.

He explained that the main objective of the programs is to professionalize training and education among DRM practitioners in the country.

"As an institution of higher learning, BatStateU is obliged and mandated to provide advanced programs that will be relevant to the nation and community. The ultimate goal is not for us [students] to be awarded a diploma, or for Batangas State University to be visible. Let our ultimate goal be to save lives... That is our mantra – to give honor and, at the same time, to protect and transform lives," Dr. Ronquillo said.

He added that the off-campus classes were implemented to address the struggle of students from other provinces and cities in travelling all the way to BatStateU just to pursue the DRM programs.

DRM Focal Person Dr. Nickie Boy A. Manalo said that classes for this semester will be held every Saturday at Fort Bonifacio, Manila until the third week of June. The diploma program is a one-year course composed of 18 units, which may be laddered towards the Master's degree in Disaster Risk Management.

Dr. Ronquillo said that the programs are non-thesis and practical by nature, wherein students will take part in an integrative course that will immerse them in local communities for the development and proposal contingency plans and disaster management policies.

Former Presidential Adviser on the Peace Process Retired General Ramon G. Santos said that the programs give individual managers the opportunity to develop their DRM knowledge and competencies.

"It is rare to meet individuals who are passionate to learn and deliver knowledge on DRM," he said in Filipino. "DRM is practically, at its very essence, about leadership. And BatStateU provides the leadership needed for scientific and evidence-based disaster planning through education and experience."

Gen. Santos is a member of the BatStateU Multi-Sectoral Advisory Council (MSAC). The council is composed of an almost 20-member agencies which collectively functions as the steering committee of the university's Disaster Resiliency Education for Adaptation and Mitigation Academy, shortly known as DREAM Academy.

The MDRM and DDRM were approved by the Commission on Higher Education (CHED) en banc on December 19, 2017, making the programs the first CHED-accredited DRM programs in CALABARZON.

Meanwhile, BatStateU will be discussing its proposals on further collaborations, including the conduct of off-campus courses in other areas, DRM conferences, and inter-agency activities for students with the OCD and the Philippine Army.

University Administrators attended a two-day training/workshoponLearningManagement System (LMS) organized by BatStateU's Instructional Materials Development Center (IMDC), on March 5 and 6 at the Lecture Room, International Affairs Office, CITE Building, Pablo Borbon Main I, Batangas City.

The activity served as an opportunity to develop the participants' creativity skills and teaching techniques in delivering classroom activities.

Attendees were VP for Academic Affairs Dr. Erma B. Quinay and VP for External Affairs and ICT Services Prof. Rogelio A. Antenor with Executive Directors, Deans, Deans of Colleges, Associate Deans, Program Chairs and General Education Teachers.

"There is a need for us [educators] to learn more," Dr. Quinay said, in her opening remarks as she stressed the importance of such training.

"We... are considered as the cutting edge of education. So therefore, it is imperative that we are always abreast with the strategies on how we could really make our students learn," she added.

The training/workshop highlighted talks and lectures from e-learning experts, Ms. Arlynne Roa-Awayan and Ms. Jenielyn E. Padernal, on how teachers can create authentic, interactive and learner-driven activities, by increasing the level of technology used in classrooms. These speakers also familiarized the participants on the features and functions of the University's LMS portal enabling them to develop a more interactive learning material for students.

Ms. Awayan is currently the

Aspiring Red Spartans take the BatStateUCAT

This year's batch of hopeful Red Spartans took the Batangas State University College Admission Test (BatStateUCAT) on February 17 for SY 2019-2020.

The examination was held simultaneously at six BatStateU campuses namely: Pablo Borbon Main (PBM) I, PBM II, JPLPC-Malvar, Rosario, Lipa City, and ARASOF-Nasugbu.

To be eligible for the test, an applicant must be a graduating senior



high school student with no grade lower than 80% if he/she wishes to pursue a board degree program.

Newly appointed Testing and Admission head Dr. Anna Maria V. Rivera said a total of 17, 433 aspirants submitted their application online which is 10% more than last year's 15,000 applicants.

The aspiring freshmen Red Spartans may expect their results to be released on March

Guidance and Counselling office conducts mental health seminar

In line with the celebration of Guidance Week 2019, the Office of Guidance and Counselling (OGC) conducted a seminar on mental health for students on February 27 at the Amphitheater, CITE Building, BatStateU Pablo Borbon Main I, Batangas City.

This seminar entitled "Building the Potentials of Students: Establishing a strong University Community" intends to provide awareness on psychological health issues among students.

Dr. Roldan C. Ragot, a registered Psychometrician and instructor from the College of Accountancy, Business, Economics and International Hospitality Management, served as the event's resource speaker.

In his presentation on "Depressive Disorders and Suicide in Children and Adolescents," Dr. Ragot talked about worldwide facts and statistics on depression allowing the students to better understand the need to fight such battles. He introduced the signs and symptoms of depression, and gave a detailed explanation about the difference between mood, emotion and affect.

Dr. Ragot said recognizing the indicators will help students determine if a person is depressed and also know the appropriate actions they need to take if they encounter such cases.

According to the World Health Organization's 2015 global school-based survey, in more than 8,000 students from grades 7-9, year 4 in the country, 11.6% among 13 to 17 year olds considered suicide, while 16.8% of the same age group have attempted suicide.

Dr. Ragot also explained that there are psychological and pharmacological treatments for depression. He then

discussed the importance of conducting effective counselling, as one of the most common therapies for depression.

OGC Asst. Director Renan T. Mallari also took part in the seminar by sharing the role of the office in building a healthy university environment.

As part of the celebration of Guidance Week 2019, the office also held a training workshop for Peer Facilitators Circle members entitled, "Gender Responsive Counselling: Action and Advocacy" last February 26 led by Asst. Dir. Mallari, Asst. Director for Gender and Development Ma. Theresa A. Hernandez, and Guidance Counselling Head Mrs. Dianne S. Cullar as resource persons.

A seminar for OGC personnel entitled "Gender Sensitive School Counsellors in Action: Tapping the Potentials of School Counsellors in Dealing with Students" was also held last March 1.

BatStateU joins the 2019 1st quarter nationwide simultaneous earthquake drill

To intensify disaster awareness and preparedness in the academic community, Batangas State University joined the 2019 first quarter Nationwide Simultaneous Earthquake Drill (NSED) on February 21.

Over a thousand students, faculty members and officials participated in the drill held at the grounds of BatStateU Pablo Borbon Main (PBM) I, Batangas City.

Aside from educating the community on what to do before, during and after an earthquake, the drill was also conducted to test the existing plans of the university which include the activation of its incident



command system with Prof. Rogelio A. Antenor, as the Incident Commander.

In 2017 BatStateU hosted the

2nd Quarter NSED in collaboration with the Office of Civil Defense (OCD) Region IV-A, Provincial Disaster Risk Reduction Management Office (DRRMO), City Disaster Risk Reduction Management Office (CDRRMO) and Bureau of Fire Protection (BFP)-Batangas City. BatStateU PBM I was then chosen as the regional ceremonial venue for CALABARZON.

NSED is a quarterly activity organized by the National Disaster Risk Reduction and Management Council (NDRRMC) that seeks to teach the public from the barangay to the national government about disaster response.

TMB members convene for 1st meeting

The University's Technopark Management Board (TMB) held its first meeting for the Batangas State University Knowledge, Innovation, Science and Technology (KIST) Park (formerly BatStateU Technopark) on January 10 at the Function Hall, CIRTC Building, Pablo Borbon Main (PBM) I, Batangas City.

The team is responsible for the management of the park during its development and operation phases, which include planning, organization, project management, operational management, risk management, property management and investment management.

The board was created on September 6, 2018 by the BatStateU Board of Regents (BOR) during the 59th regular meeting.

During the TMB meeting, BatStateU President Tirso A. Ronquillo and VP for Research, Development and Extension Services Albertson Amante delivered a presentation about the park's objectives. The park's Site Development Plan, Procurement Plan for Design Services and 2019 Program of Expenditures were presented to identify areas for improvement.

The KIST Park shall bring science and technology-based R&D results of the university to the market through establishing facilities for product development and locator spaces for incubation of startups and spin-offs. This shall also build a sustainable entrepreneurial ecosystem among the academe, industry and

community through various knowledgedriven innovation programs and public private partnerships.

The KIST Park is now being endorsed by the Department of Trade and Industry (DTI) to the Malacañan for presidential proclamation. Once granted, the agreement between BatStateU and the Philippine Economic Zone Authority (PEZA) will be prepared, signed and registered, thus authorizing the university to commence with

the establishment of the KIST Park.

It will be located adjacent to BatStateU PBM II in Alangilan, Batangas City, with approximately 2.8 hectares of land.

The re-classification of BatStateU Technopark to KIST Park was approved by the BOR on May 30, 2018 during their first special meeting through Board Resolution No. 26 S. 2018. This was an advice from the PEZA to expand the mandate of the applied technology park.


STRATEGIC PLANNING WORKSHOP FOR FACULTY AND STUDENTS

Batangas State University's Verde Island Passage Center for Oceanographic Research and Aquatic Life Sciences (VIP CORALS) conducted a seminar entitled, "Waves and Ripples at the Heart of the Coral Triangle" on February 14 in celebration of its first anniversary at the Amphitheater, CITE Building, BatStateU Pablo Borbon Main I.

In the opening program, BatStateU President Dr. Tirso A. Ronquillo shared about the importance of the VIP CORALS not just for the academe but also for the local communities that will greatly benefit from the studies and researches done in the center. He shared that the university, as the closest institution to the VIP, "must take full responsibility for doing researches in the shallow and deeper waters of it." Dr. Ronquillo also emphasized the role of the

university to educate nearby communities on how they can help protect VIP's marine resources.

Speakers of the event were Dr. Renan Bobiles of Bicol University, Dr. Emma Ballad from the Bureau of Fisheries and Aquatic Resources, Dr. Maria Vanessa Baria-Rodriguez, Talna dela Cruz, Dr. Wilfred John Santiañez of the UP-Marine Science Institute (UP MSI), Dr. Dexter dela Cruz of Southern Cross University, Joal Ascalon of Southeast Asia Institute - VIP, and Nero Austero from the National Museum of the Philippines.

The speakers discussed topics on marine protected areas, socioenvironmental economics, coral reefs, seaweed farming, coral reef restoration, environmental awareness, science communication, and maritime archaeology. To end the series of talks and discussions, VIP CORALS Center Head Dr. Jayvee A. Saco presented the progress of the center and its accomplishments in the areas of instruction, research and extension services.

The VIP CORALS is BatStateU's marine research facility located at the BatStateU Lobo that aims to provide science-based information on prediction of impending natural or man-made calamities, designing management protocol on commercially important marine organisms, identify marine organisms and communities that need protection and conservation, technology development for creating and improving livelihood, natural product development, education to different stakeholders, and creation of network consortium among different organisms bordering the VIP.

The Verde Island Passage Center for Oceanographic Research and Aquatic Life Sciences (VIP CORALS) held a seminar on Biological Activity and Marine Biodiversity on January 18 at the 7th floor Multimedia Room, CIRTC Building, Pablo Borbon Main I, Batangas City.

Resource persons include Associate Professor Armin S. Coronado of the Institute for Science and Technology Research Director from the Polytechnic University of the Philippines, and Dr. Noel Saguil, a Post-Doctoral Research Associate of Olivera Lab University of Utah

Coronado talked about the Biological Activity of Sulfated Polysaccharides from Brown Seaweeds and its Application to Pharmaceutical Related Fields, where he took time to share some matters to consider before starting an experiment and come up with a good research.

The event, organized by the Guidance and Counselling Office, was capped off with a Q&A session where 100 students from different colleges of Pablo Borbon Main I participated in.












Batangas State University joined the ASEAN Business Incubation Network (ABINET) on the Development of a Virtual Incubation Platform for ASEAN TBIs.
