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Free tuition law IRR launched

IT'S OFFICIAL. Members of the UniFAST Governing Board sign the implementing rules and regulations of Republic Act No. 10931, the Universal Access to Quality Education Act, on March 26 as free tuition lawmakers witness the event.

On March 26, the Commission on Higher Education formally released the implementing rules and regulations (IRR) of the Republic Act No. 10931 also known as the Universal Access to Quality Education Act.

At least Php 40 billion has been allocated for the first year of the implementation of the free tuition law.

The budget allotment is distributed to different forms of education: Php 16 billion for free higher education, Php 7 billion for free technical-vocational education, Php 15.851 billion for tertiary education subsidy, Php 1 billion for student loan program, Php 11 million for Tertiary Education Tracking and Reporting System, and Php 11 million for the administrative cost of the Unified Student Financial Assistance System for Tertiary Education (UniFAST) 2018.

Backgrounder: Frequently Asked Questions about the Free Tuition Law

WHO CAN AVAIL THE FREE TUITION LAW?

- > All students currently enrolled or will enroll during the approval of the Free Tuition Law in pursuing a bachelor's degree, certificate degree or any undergrad degree comparable given that they pass the admission and retention requirements in any state university or college (SUC), local university or college (LUC) and state-run technical-vocational institutions (TVI).
- > SUCs, LUCs and state-run TVIs must create a mechanism wherein students with financial capacity may voluntarily pay for their tuition and other school fees.

WHO CANNOT AVAIL THE FREE TUITION LAW?

- > Students who already have a bachelor's degree or any comparable undergraduate degree from any Higher Education Institution (HEI), whether public or private
- > Students who fail to comply with the admission and retention policies of SUCs, LUCs, and state-run TVIs.
- > Students who fail to complete their bachelor's degree or any comparable undergraduate degree within a year after the period prescribed in their program
- > Students who fail in any course enrolled in during the course of the program

IS THERE A LOAN PROGRAM AVAILABLE FOR STUDENTS?

The UniFAST Board is expected to create short-term

and long-term plans for student loan programs. A student may avail of the loan program upon pursuing an undergraduate degree considering the following:

- > If a student wants to pursue medicine or law, but has already availed of the loan program, he/she may re-avail once the first loan has been fully paid.
- > If a student wants to pursue medicine or law, and has not yet availed of the loan program, he/she may avail of the loan program for further studies.
- > If a student needs to review for licensure or board examinations administered by the Professional Regulation Commission (PRC), he/she may avail of the loan program for review expenses.

HOW WILL THE STUDENT LOANS BE PAID?

- > Student loans may be paid through Social Security System or Government Service Insurance System if the beneficiary is a government employee.
- > Payment of loan amount will start once the beneficiary is able to secure a stable job with compensation that reaches the Compulsory Repayment Threshold (CRT). For this act, the CRT shall be reviewed by the UniFAST Board and adjusted when necessary.

WHO WILL ADMINISTER THE STUDENT LOAN PROGRAMS?

The UniFAST Board shall create a loan repayment guideline for those who availed the loan program who are not covered by GSIS or SSS, including OFWs, emigrants and self-employed persons and

professionals (SEPs).

WHAT DOES TES COVER?

Tertiary Education Subsidy (TES) covers:

- > Tuition and other school fees
- > Allowance for books, supplies, transportation and miscellaneous personal expenses, including a reasonable allowance for the documented rental or purchase of a personal computer or laptop, and other education-related expenses
- > Housing/boarding allowance
- > Allowance for students with disability
- > Allowance for students who require professional license or certification after finishing undergraduate studies, the one-time cost of obtaining the first professional credentials or qualifications

WHO CAN AVAIL TES?

- > Students who are part of households included in the Listahan 2.0* ranked according to the estimated per capita household income.
- > Students not part of the Listahan 2.0 ranked according to estimate per capita household income based on submitted documentation of proof of income to be determined by the UniFAST Board

*Listahan 2.0 refers to the information management of DSWD that identifies who and where the poor are in the country.

University hosts CDIO training with Singapore Polytechnic and Temasek Foundation

Batangas State University, in collaboration with the Singapore Polytechnic (SP) and Temasek Foundation International (TFI), hosted the Advancing CDIO Training on February 5-8 at the BatStateU Pablo Borbon Main I.

Deans, associate deans, program directors and engineering faculty from member institutions of the Philippine Association of State Universities and Colleges (PASUC) gathered to learn about the Conceive, Design, Implement, and Operate (CDIO) framework.

Focusing on sustaining CDIO initiatives, the four-day workshop is a TFI-SP Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET-Engineering) Specialists Programme which taught the participating SUCs in forming strategic requirements and raising professional academic standards by strengthening the implementation of CDIO and rethinking engineering education. This includes professional development in knowledge, practices, and engagement.

"The CDIO framework is one of the best practices to implement an outcomes-based education in the Philippines", BatStateU

President Tirso A. Ronquillo said, adding that the framework will help their institutions to develop 21st century professionals whom industries need.

Singapore Polytechnic facilitators oriented and mentored the participants during the four-day in the workshop.

By the end of the training, they would select potential Master Trainers among the participants whom they will develop as CDIO facilitators like them.

TECO visits BatStateU, presents faculty scholarship programs to SUCs in CALABARZON

Aiming to strengthen the proficiency and competitiveness of faculty members in the Philippines, the Taipei Economic and Cultural Office (TECO) visited BatStateU for a meeting with the presidents of Region IV-A State Universities and Colleges (SUCs) on January 5 at BatStateU Pablo Borbon Main I to present its faculty exchange program between Taiwan and the Philippines.

TECO Director Jerry Chuang discussed the available scholarship program offerings for Filipino faculty members.

These include (1) Ministry of Education (MOE) Scholarship, (2) Huayu (Mandarin)

Enrichment Scholarship and, (3) International Cooperation and Development Fund which cover tuition fees, monthly stipends book allowances, and airfare tickets, depending on the program availed.

Chuang mentioned that the scholarship programs are applicable to Filipinos who wish to pursue graduate school studies in Taiwan Universities or learn the Mandarin Language in the Republic of China.

Dr. Alex Bello Brillantes Jr., former CHED Commissioner, shared that the linkages with Taiwan continue to expand, adding that the Taiwanese partners will return to the Philippines this semester with improved scholarship opportunities to offer to Filipinos.

Applications for the scholarship programs started on February 1.

Secretary Diokno, President Ronquillo talk on NBC 461 and ROSSSS

Philippine Association of State Universities and Colleges (PASUC) and Batangas State University (BatStateU) President Tirso A. Ronquillo met with Department of Budget and Management (DBM) Secretary Benjamin E. Diokno on January 17.

This was to discuss the National Budget Circular No. 461 7th cycle, and the plantilla item positions for non-teaching personnel.

NBC. 461 was issued to establish and prescribe rules and regulations on the implementation of the Revised Compensation and Position Classification Plan for faculty positions in state universities and colleges (SUCs), higher education institutions (HEIs) and technical education institutions (TEIs) in accordance with the modified Common Criteria for Evaluation (CCE) of faculty positions.

One of the outcomes of the meeting was the possible allocation of funds for

item positions for non-teaching personnel in 2019.

This is subject to further discussion and approval under the national budget for state universities and colleges, which will also depend on the approval of the Revised Organizational Structure and Staffing Standards for SUCs (ROSSSS).

ROSSSS was developed by PASUC is to be submitted to the Commission on Higher Education, which will then endorse the same to DBM.

BatStateU tops 2018 mechanical engineering licensure examination

Surpassing a total of 149 schools, Batangas State University was once again hailed as the Top Performing School with a 99.15% passing rate in the recent Mechanical Engineering Licensure Examination given on February 26 and 27.

Seven examinees from the university were also able to enter the top 10 list of passers for the exam.

Kelvin Mendoza Macatangay topped the rankings with a rating of 88.75%.

Efren Espino Suarez, Jr. came third with 87.90%, while Emanuelito Abion Aristorenas ranked fifth with 87.10%.

Other successful BatStateU examinees who grabbed the highest rankings are Hazel Joy Diola Veyra (Rank 6), Dyve Balbalosa De Ocampo (Rank 7), Adrian Danao Bautista (Rank 8), and Anna Rizza Regalado Ebreo (Rank 10).

"We are not only happy, but more than proud of everyone for conquering one of the toughest challenges of your lives," University President Tirso A. Ronquillo said in a message, adding that their achievement is a reflection of their development as "productive Filipinos who will serve as leaders of the present and future generations."

Bicol University holds international conference; President Ronquillo delivers keynote address

The Bicol University, through its Research, Development and Extension Service office, held the 2018 Bicol International Research, Development and Extension Conference with the theme, "Translating Research to Innovations in Science, Technology and Natural Resources Management" at the Food Innovation Commercialization Center, Bicol University East Campus, Legazpi City on March 16-18.

The three-day conference served as a venue for professionals, educators, researchers, and industries from the country and the ASEAN region to gather and interact with participants from different disciplines.

It also provided a platform to present the latest research studies on different fields through parallel sessions, plenary talks, and poster presentations categorized into: Food Security and Poverty Reduction;

Climate Change and Natural Resources Management; Global Competitiveness of Business and Industry; Social Development Promotion; Institutional and Policy Research; and Educational Innovation.

PASUC holds first executive board meeting

The Philippine Association of State Universities and Colleges (PASUC) held its first special executive board meeting on March 8 at the Waterfront Cebu City Hotel, Lahug, Cebu City.

As PASUC President, BatStateU President Tirso A. Ronquillo presided the meeting in the presence of SUC presidents and heads, together with their respective vice president for administration and finance, chief administrative officer, and

human resource management officer.

He started the meeting with the enhancement of the Revised Organizational Structure and Staffing Standards for SUCs (ROSSS), which was eventually approved by the PASUC board.

Another agenda was the PASUC financial statement for FY 2017 which outlined the financial activities and position of the association for the previous year.

Academic and administrative councils discuss guidelines for international students mobility

The Academic and Administrative Councils held a joint meeting to discuss the proposed guidelines for International Student Mobility and Credit Transfer Policy on March 6 at the Amphitheater, CITE Building, BatStateU Pablo Borbon Main I, Batangas City.

The meeting was held to revise and standardize the curricula, and to develop a pragmatic credit transfer scheme and mobility policy that may place its strategic position to establish linkages with higher education institutions in the ASEAN region.

In his opening address, University President Tirso A. Ronquillo emphasized the need to boost the ASEAN Higher Education Systems to ensure global competitiveness among Higher Education Institutions.

During the meeting, the officials approved the guidelines and principles for the realization of the International Student Mobility program, which focuses on student recruitment and enrollment, program, limits of credit, credit application form, ease and timing of lodgement, follow-up during processing, avenues of appeal, and credit transfer system policy.

It was agreed that BatStateU shall adopt the University Mobility in Asia and Pacific (UMAP) Credit Transfer Schemes a system of credit transfer to facilitate students' earning of credits among universities participating in international students' mobility program.

Prior the joint council meeting, Vice President for Academic Affairs Erma B. Quinay, together with the deans, associate deans and program chairs of the main campuses attended a curriculum review workshop for ASEAN Mutual Recognition Agreement last March 1 and 2.

It was organized to review the University's current curricula in all disciplines as well as its policies in compliance to the mutual agreement among ASEAN member states relative to CHED CMO Nos. 33 S. 2013 and 11 S. 2014.

The participants were able to formulate the general policies on credit transfer and evaluate schemes for crediting of courses for entering ASEAN students.

BoR approves supplemental budget for 2018

Through Resolution No. 006, S.2018, the BatStateU Board of Regents (BoR) approved the University's supplemental budget for 2018, amounting to Php 1.08 billion.

The proposed budget was presented on February 14 during the 57th regular meeting of the BoR at the HEDC Bldg., Commission on Higher Education, Diliman, Quezon City.

As a university that prioritizes the needs of its students, employees and stakeholders, the approved additional budget covers funds intended for its major infrastructure developments, which include the construction of various learning facilities, and the rehabilitation and improvement of the existing amenities of its different campuses.

The university also allotted funds for faculty development scholarships, accreditation expenses, extension and research projects, instructional materials, laboratory and cultural equipment, library books and upgrading of internet connection to continuously provide extended support to its clients.

Two months earlier, the BoR also approved the University's 2018 Program of Receipts and Expenditures (PRE) amounting to Php 713,879,130.00 in total through Res. No. 760, S. 2017.

"Great is thy faithfulness from North to South, East to West, let everything that has air declare: Great is thy faithfulness."

These were the words of University President Tirso A. Ronquillo said on March 26 as he presented the accomplishments of the university for the past four years under his administration in a public forum entitled "President's Report: State of BatStateU".

"Inspired by a shared vision of making BatStateU a globally recognized institution of learning, the community was able to further strengthen its performance in instruction, research, extension service and resource management," he said.

The President centered the university achievements on eight major areas: 1) educational excellence and improved academic services; 2) research productivity, leadership and innovation; 3) extension

services; 4) infrastructure development; 5) fiscal management; 6) foreign and local partnerships; 7) innovations and good governance; and 8) other significant accomplishments.

Highlights of the university achievements include ISO 9001:2008 certification, designation as Center of Excellence and Center of Development, Level IV accreditation of five academic programs, establishment of ACTION Center and DREAM Academy, PEZA Registration of TechnoPark, awards and recognitions in research and extension services, and continuous excellent performance in licensure examinations.

The forum was one of the means conducted to assess the performance of Dr. Ronquillo, who recently sought for reappointment before the Commission on Higher Education on February 2018.


statement and project statement, validated insights and needs, and co-created solutions to address the needs of communities using existing prototypes.

MARINE CONSERVATION

Batangas State University takes another leap in responding to the challenges of the region.

As an archipelagic country, the Philippines is known for its diverse Marine life. It belongs to the Coral Triangle which includes the Verde Island Passage (VIP), considered as the world's center of the center of marine shore fish biodiversity, located in the south-western part of Luzon Island.

Being one of the richest areas in the entire Coral Triangle, VIP is home to different species of corals, shore fishes, marine turtles, dolphins and whales, as well as marine invertebrates and plants. However, the increasing tourism, industrialization and human activities led to adverse effects that may cause serious damage to its biodiversity.

To protect and conserve VIP, Batangas State University led by President Tirso A. Ronquillo established a marine biodiversity

research center, officially called the VIP Center for Oceanographic Research and Aquatic Life Sciences (VIP CORALS).

Dr. Ronquillo presented the proposal for its establishment before the BatStateU Board of Regents (BoR) during their 57th regular meeting on February 14 at the HEDC Building, Commission on Higher Education, Diliman, Quezon City. This includes the Php 25 million initial budget for the center's establishment.

VIP CORALS will be situated in BatStateU Lobo where basic research, teaching, and extension on the six major components of VIP will be provided: coral reef ecosystem, seaweed and seagrass ecosystem, mangrove ecosystem, plankton ecosystem, fish and other invertebrates ecosystem, and oceanographic ecosystem. The basic

research will cover regular monitoring of the status of the various key ecosystems and their physicochemical characteristics.

As part of the University's strategic plan, the project will serve as a venue to conduct extensive studies on the eco-physiological profiling of the different targeted marine organisms.

Furthermore, the center will house different facilities such as a main laboratory building, outdoor hatchery, dive locker, and other necessary equipment for the conduct of research and extension services in the VIP.

Prior the endorsement of the proposal to the BoR, the project was presented on February 7 during the BatStateU Administrative Council meeting by Dr. Jayvee A. Saco, Center Head of VIP CORALS.

STRENGTHENING RESEARCH CAPABILITIES

THROUGH COLLABORATIVE LINKAGES

The capacity of the marine research center can be strengthened through active collaboration with leading local and international universities. To start, Batangas State University invited Dr. Satoshi Kubota from Kochi University in Japan to conduct a lecture on Marine Science on March 8 at the Multimedia Room, CIRTC Building, BatStateU Pablo Borbon Main I.

Students from the College of Arts and Sciences (CAS) and faculty members were invited to attend and learn from his presentation on the Recent Coral Research Projects in Kochi University and its facilities for marine research.

Dr. Kubota is a professor under the Laboratory of Human Health and Medical Science specializing on the biochemical analysis of food and marine bio resources; and construction of integrated healthcare and nutrition care systems and sustainable human society.

He is also the Vice Head of the Kuroshio Science Program under the Graduate School of Integrated Arts and Sciences of the same University.

The lecture was followed by the presentation on the University's proposed establishment of Verde Island Passage Center for Oceanographic Research and Aquatic Life Sciences (VIP CORALS) by Dr. Jayvee Saco, Center Head.

By establishing linkages with different universities and professionals, VIP CORALS can expand its pool of knowledge, techniques, and research practices in marine ecosystems.





Building Effective Partnership with Batangas City Local Government

Batangas State University officials met with the members of the Batangas City Local Government and Sangguniang Panlungsod on January 12 at the CIRTC, BatStateU Pablo Borbon Main I. This was conducted to keep them updated on the developments of the proposed BatStateU Technology Park.

Based on the guidelines on the registration of Technology Parks, the endorsement of the Sanggunian Bayan/Panlungsod for the development of the economic zone is one of the standard proclamation pre-requirements for the application to the Philippine Economic Zone Authority. In compliance, BatStateU was able to acquire the unanimous endorsement from the Sanggunian Panlungsod of Batangas City on August 22. After the submission of documentary requirements, the Technopark was approved by PEZA on December 4.

University President Tirso A. Ronquillo shared that the Sanggunian endorsement was an important ingredient in the issuance of the PEZA Board Resolution approval. With the support from the local government, the application for the Technopark is currently endorsed by PEZA for proclamation by the president of the Philippines, Rodrigo Roa Duterte.

Batangas 5th District Representative Mario Vittorio "Marvey" A. Mariño said that the establishment of the Technopark will bring economic opportunities to Batangas. Given its strategic location, proximity to the pier, and interconnectedness of transportation infrastructure, locators will come and invest in the province.

VP for Research, Development and Extension Services Albertson D. Amante also presented the other programs and projects of the University for Batangas City. This includes the construction of water retention facilities in areas suffering from floods during heavy rains to mitigate the preexisting flooding

problem in Batangas City. Based on the initial survey, the flooding is mainly caused by the unconnected and clogged drainage systems. BatStateU proposed a layout of the water collection basin which shows the drainage classification mapping.

Batangas City Mayor Beverley Rose Dimacuha expressed her excitement on the vision of the university towards the improvement of the city. She vowed her support for the future activities of the university, and conveyed that the local government and BatStateU shall continue to be partners in the development of Batangas City.

The proposed site is located at Mega Heights Subdivision beside BatStateU Pablo Borbon Main II in Alangilan, Batangas. For the upcoming years, the neighboring lots or sites in the said subdivision will be occupied by residential buildings.

The access between the campus and the park shall be prominent with clear and easily identifiable signs to and from the school building, and its entrance clearly visible.

SOCIAL SPACES

A variety of informal and social areas will be created to suit the learning development and cultural needs of the students during breaks, end of classes, and formal curriculum needs.

DESIGN COMPOSITION


The design of the Technopark will reflect a clear and strong architectural concept underpinning the form and character of Batangas State University.

GETTING BIGGER, SOARING HIGHER

Batangas State University continues its expansion in Batangas Province as it opens its new campus in Mabini for admission.

With the collaborative efforts of the University President Tirso A. Ronquillo and Mabini Mayor Noel B. Luistro, the vision to establish a new campus in Mabini, Batangas has been brought to life. It was approved by the BatStateU Board of Regents (BoR) through Resolution No. 547, S. 2016 on December 28, 2016.

Under Republic Act 9045 Section 3, the university is mandated to offer undergraduate, graduate and short-term technical courses within the areas of specialization and according to its capabilities, as the BoR may deem necessary to carry out its objectives, particularly in order to meet the needs of the province and the region.

The campus, to be known as BatStateU Mabini, will house a 1,777.86 sqm. Higher Education Building seated on its five hectare property donated by the Municipality of Mabini. It offers programs under the College of Accountancy, Business Economics and International Hospitality Management (CABEIHM), College of Arts and Sciences (CAS), and College of Engineering and Computing

Sciences (CECS) namely: BS Business Administration major in Marketing Management and Operation Management, BS Entrepreneurship, BS Management Accounting, BS Tourism Management, BS Development Communication, BS Information Technology, and General Engineering. The admission of students started on March 5, 2018.

As stated in the aforementioned board resolution, the campus is expected to generate social and economic benefits, especially business, employment and career opportunities for the people of the municipality.

As an institution of higher learning, BatStateU continues to provide a conducive learning environment that seeks to develop morally upright and competitive individuals.
